

of Greater Oklahoma City has

agency and subject-matter
expert in the African American
community providing affordable
housing, workforce development,
employment, and education services.

For 75 years, the Urban League has been "HERE for the community". Deeply rooted physically and culturally in the African American community in the Oklahoma City metropolitan area, the agency's mission is to assist African Americans, other minorities and the poor achieve social and economic equality. Our core programs touch approximately 9,000 people annually.

The Urban League is HERE (Helping Empower and Retain Employees). The Urban League's workforce program focuses on strategic partnerships with criminal justice organizations, community colleges/vocational training centers, employers, client linkages to support services, and trauma-informed approaches to case management. Our career coaches understand when people come to the Urban League, they struggle to meet basic needs and are often confronted with daily emotional and social challenges that create barriers to employment. The Urban League's workforce program is employment-focused and exceptionally well-equipped at providing supportive services to remove the obstacles to employment. The Urban League connects justice-involved clients to diversion opportunities and gives them the ability to change behaviors and obtain a second chance to achieve their goals. The Urban League has a long successful record of disrupting poverty in Oklahoma's African American community.

The Urban League is HERE (Helping Educate, Reward, and Encourage kids). The Urban League's Education and Family Development department provides tutoring and wrap-around support to Oklahoma City Public School District's Thelma Park Elementary and we operate a 2-star DHS licensed School-Age Learning Center at the Urban League's headquarters. The Urban League specializes in supporting minority children and offers an academically enriched learning environment where students from kindergarten through 6th grade can feel safe, welcomed, and comfortable to network with their peers. The program ensures improvement in school through academic

enrichment in science, literacy, technology, and math. The Urban League promotes social and personal skills development for parents/ caregivers by providing them with tools to create experiences to support their child's academic success.

By providing Housing Expansion and Rebuilding Equitable communities, the Urban League is HERE. For 75 years, the Urban League has been the leader in minority economic development in Oklahoma through our housing, financial literacy, and business programs. Over 100 families maintained affordable housing during the COVID-19 crisis living in the 107 units of housing the Urban League owns and

operates. We provide clients with free financial literacy and homebuyer education classes. Business coaching is also provided to minority businesses. Clients meet with an Urban League business advisor to enroll in RISE-UP Business Certification Programs. The Urban League is HERE (Helping Entrepreneurs Reach Excellence).

The Urban League's Community Convening and Social Justice (CCSJ) program focuses on fighting for social justice and addressing the racial inequalities in black and brown communities related to social mobility and economic empowerment. CCSJ advocates for clients on voter education and mobilization, criminal justice reform, police reform, and inclusive economic development. In 2021, the ULOKC hosted the largest Expungement Expo in the state of Oklahoma servicing 809 people. Anxious people stood in line outside the facility for hours before the event in hopes of getting information or assistance on how to expunge their records. The Urban League is HERE (Highlighting Expungement and Rehabilitative Excellence).

The Urban League is HERE. We are shining a light on our work and sharing a snapshot of the Urban League's services that have become life-changing for our clients. We continue to be unwavering, intentional, and impactful in serving people of color and the poor.

The Urban League of Greater Oklahoma City will continue to be the leading nonprofit organization serving this community for the next 75 years.

WORKFORCE & CAREER DEVELOPMENT

This program specializes in assessing and addressing barriers for individuals to increase their employability opportunities. We serve individuals who are unemployed, underemployed, seeking a career change, and previously or currently justice-involved. This program helps strengthen the economic well-being of Oklahoma County's African American families and other families living in poverty by increasing sustainable employment that will lead to self-sufficiency and less dependent on government subsidies. We provide access to industry-recognized certification, work readiness training, and connections with employers with an emphasis on high-demand occupations. We served over 1,880 clients last year. EDUCATION & FAMILY DEVELOPMENT

This program specializes in supporting minority children to ensure success in school and development through achieving academic enrichment in subjects of science, literacy, technology, and math; social and personal skills development, and support to parents/caregivers by providing them tools to create environments and experiences that promote their child's academic success. Urban League's HERE (Highlighting Expungement and Rehabilitative Excellence) program helps ex-offenders seal their records so that they can secure employment and move beyond the challenges of having a past criminal record by educating them about their rights. A Moment in Urban League History......

1946-1957...The acceptance of Blacks as apprentices in local unions and the entrance of Black women in local hospital-base nursing training. 

Florence's Restaurant

Florence Jones-Kemp was born on a rural farm in Boley, Oklahoma. Other than the year being 1931, the exact date of her birth is unknown. Her mother recalls it as March 4th; her father is sure it is March 5th. Her delayed birth certificate list both days. She is the 4th of 5 children born to Elizabeth and Robert H. Jones, who moved to Oklahoma City in 1943. She attended Douglas High School and was a majorette in the school band. She is a proud member of the 1950 graduating class and is Douglas' oldest living majorette. She excelled in home economics and appeared to be headed for a career as a tailor and patternmaker. She was such a talented tailor that her teachers recruited Florence regularly to make clothes for their children and grandchildren.

In the summer of 1950, after high school graduation, Florence made a bold decision to move to California with her aunt, Carrie Johnson, and cousin Mildred Reval. Her cousin Mildred and her husband were business owners in Merced, California and the restaurant they owned was a local hot spot. Florence lived with them and learned every aspect of the business, still not knowing how it would affect her future. Florence had opened several restaurants in OKC throughout her life before she decided she would purchase a plot of land and build a home for her business from the ground up in 1969. She started three other businesses, including a barbershop, a self-serve car wash, and a residential rental property.

At age 90, she's still going strong. Mrs. Kemp is the mother of two daughters and two sons. She also is a cancer survivor. Florence's restaurant will celebrate its 70th year in business in April. She has gained not only local but national attention and accolades. Her signature dish has been named one of the top 3 chicken dishes from Diners, Drive-Ins and Dives. Florence created a retail product line of her fried chicken seasoning, cornbread mix, pancake and waffle mix, and barbeque sauce. In February of 2022, she became the first person in Oklahoma to be awarded the national prestigious James Beard Award. She has been a March of Dines volunteer, donated food to worthy charities, and fed countless strangers and others.


